ON FAITH:

USCCB "In regard to faith, about 70 percent of [U.S.] Hispanics call themselves Catholic. Most others identify themselves with different Christian denominations and yet anecdotal evidence suggests that many of them continue to practice certain aspects of Catholic faith and life, particularly those related to popular devotions. This is not surprising since Hispanic culture is shaped by Catholic values, symbols and expressions."

Barna Group: [Nationally,] Protestants have accounted for about one of every five Hispanics. However, the percentage of Hispanics in Catholic circles fell 23 points [over the past 20 years], to its present 45 percent...So most Hispanic ex-Catholics "simply dropped out of organized religion altogether."

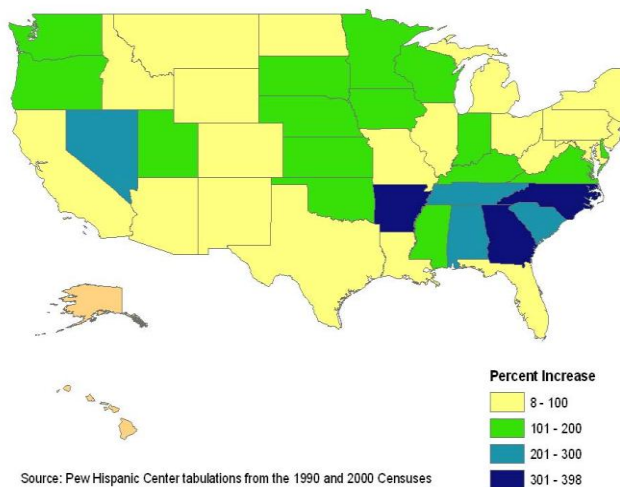
